ST MARK'S AT THE PROMS

On 29th July, St Mark's Choir joined forces with a selection of other London choirs, and choirs from all over the country, to perform in a special concert as part of the celebrated BBC Proms Music Festival.

'Ten Pieces' is a special programme run by the BBC to promote classical music in schools and focuses on students learning and appreciating ten specifically chosen pieces from Bach's Toccata and Fugue to Stravinsky's Firebird. The 'Ten Pieces' Prom, explains and performs all 10 pieces with celebrity guests, the BBC singers and BBC Symphony Orchestra. It is a great honour to be part of such an

internationally recognised concert series.

As with all Proms concerts, the final performance was at the Royal Albert Hall. On Monday 16th July, the choir made their way to the venue to rehearse with the other choirs and practise singing in the phenomenal surroundings!!!

The day did not disappoint at all! After arriving at the RAH, students were led straight into the choir stalls, which are behind the stage where the orchestra will sit. Issy Adams, choirmaster for BBC Ten Pieces Proms Choir and members of the BBC Singers led the rehearsal.

It was a great opportunity for the students to experience a professional rehearsal with one of the most inspirational choir masters in the country in one of the most prestigious music venues!





Students rehearsed Carl Orff's 'O Fortuna' from the ballet suite 'Carmina Burana'. This piece has up to 8 harmonies at one time with the sopranos reaching the heady heights of a top A!!! The tenors and basses blasted out their solid bass lines to support the higher singers. The acoustics of the RAH made the performance all the more spine tingling and it was super to hear the Latin pronunciation of the students improving all the time!

The second piece the choir rehearsed was Kerry Andrew's 'No Place Like', a contemporary piece that celebrates where we live. This performance contains more loops and 'urban sounds' from our Hammersmith performance and again, hearing up to eight different parts singing in the acoustics of the Royal Albert Hall was breathtaking.

At the beginning of November, approximately 50 of our best year 12 and 13 mathematicians, along with just over a tenth of a million students nationwide, took part in the 2018 UK Senior Maths Challenge.

This taxing 25 question multiple-choice test of their mathematical ability aims to provoke a different sort of mathematical thinking and problem-solving to the challenge provided by the A-level.

I am happy to report that just over 50% of them have since earned a Bronze, Silver or Gold Award Certificate.

A special mention should go to Piotr Gnap and Jai Trehan of year 13 for attaining the prestigious Gold Award this year.

Both of them, by dint of their scores, also earned the right to take part in the Senior Kangaroo follow-on round - so named in honour of the Australians, who were first to organise a national student maths competition.

Congratulations should also be extended to our 4 Silver and 19 Bronze Award winners, and to the 5 other candidates who were just 1 correct answer shy of a Bronze Award. I know the students would like to thank their maths teachers for the smooth running of this year's Challenge, as indeed would I.

If any parents/guardians are interested in seeing the challenge posed to our senior students in this exacting annual workout of the grey matter, this year's and previous years' papers and solutions can be found on-line, initially at 'UKMT'.

ETON SUMMER SCHOOL

At the end of the summer term, ten Year 12 students including myself had the wonderful opportunity to attend the 'Eton College Summer School'. This is a ten day residential course, held at the prestigious Eton College, which aims to emulate the environment of studying at degree level. Students are able to choose a subject which they are passionate about and use this curiosity to push themselves outside their comfort zones and explore their subject in a way that they are normally unable to back at home. I chose to study English Literature and I studied a wide range of topics and texts ranging from 18th Century satire, 'The Waste Land' by T. S. Eliot, 'Paradise Lost' by John Milton and American short stories. The day began with two one-and-a-half-hour sessions followed by a necessary tea break before we returned for another one hour session. These lessons were largely discussion based with the teachers being free from the restrictions of a syllabus. Their genuine love for their chosen topic was clear which made the lessons such an amazing experience. When we were not sharing our opinions in class, we went on several excursions, including a trip to the Globe Theatre to watch 'A Winter's Tale' and a visit to John Milton's cottage. We even visited the College Library where we saw first edition copies of Shakespeare and George Orwell's works. Outside of English, there were trips to the Tate Modern and Cambridge University. Following our subject lessons, we were able to choose from a range of activities to do in our 'free time'. These activities included swimming, board games, dodgeball, chalk drawing, script writing and even Ceilidh dancing (a traditional form of Scottish dancing). In the evening, there was a tutor session where you would discuss your day and general life with a small group of other students in a relaxed environment. This was followed by a general lecture based on topics such as fake news to illusions. It was such a different experience to daily life in Hounslow and it was extremely interesting to see how quickly we all adapted to the intensity of this course. Tutors also gave practice interviews and tips on how to write our personal statement which helped all students immensely. The course was definitely challenging with such a full schedule demanding a huge amount of hard work and effort. Having to adapt to working for such long hours and being in a completely new environment was tough at first but it provided an extremely valuable lesson about what life will be like in university. While the course aims to push you academically, some of the most important lessons I learnt were outside the classroom. In just ten days, you make long-lasting friendships, develop your social skills and build on your confidence. In a short space of time, we all ended up feeling like we had known each other for years and it was hard to realise that you would soon go back to 'normal' life. One of my favourite memories was just sitting in the TV room watching one of England's World Cup matches with such excitement that we were all screaming at the TV. By the end, we had grown so accustomed to this routine that going home was such a surreal experience. One of our main concerns was how we were going to cope with returning to school without having regular tea breaks. This course was the most enriching opportunity with every single one of us learning how to be more confident and becoming more prepared to go to university. While it was worlds apart from what we were used to, it was something that we all thoroughly enjoyed. It was such a memorable ten days and I would highly recommend applying if you have the opportunity.

CAREERS



On 18th and 19th July 2018, Year 10 had two days off timetable to focus on the World of Work and their next steps after they leave St Mark's at the end of Year 11. The majority will return to St Mark's 6th Form and progress to University or Higher Level Apprenticeships but all pupils learnt about the possibilities and opportunities open to them once they have their GCSEs. To begin with, pupils looked at what careers they were interested in and then

how they could map out a path to achieve their ambitions. We make use of two websites to help with this – 'Fast Tomato' and 'Careers Companion'. Both programmes are interactive and pupils can see the various qualifications they need to pursue their dreams. They also explored the various routes they can take to gain those qualifications, including courses run by local schools and colleges as well as St Mark's.

The day also focused on preparing a Personal Statement and CV which best presented them to prospective colleges and employers, with a close eye on preparing for Day 2 when every Year 10 pupil was interviewed by someone from the business community with experience in the real world of work. The students were told they would be interviewed for a generic work placement and asked a series of questions they might well be asked in a job interview. We prepared possible answers as well as watching videos that showed interviews at their worst and their best! The pupils made very sure that they practised handshakes to create a good first impression.



On the day of the interviews, all Year 10 attended school in business dress according to an appointment schedule and were interviewed formally. They all looked absolutely amazing and so many of the interviewers – we had 28 volunteers! – said how impressed they were by the young people of St Mark's, with several saying they would be very happy to employ their interviewees!



Following on from these very successful days, and now in Year 11, the students attended a Careers Event where they learnt about various job sectors and what it was like to work in these sectors. The students attended workshops and a Speed-Networking opportunity.

There were four workshops from which the students chose two to attend. The workshops were provided by the NHS, the London Borough of Hounslow, GlaxoSmithKline and Global, the media organisation that owns Heart and LBC radio stations amongst others. The talks involved an introduction to the sector, an overview of the different types of roles and careers in the industry and information on how pupils could go about joining the sector.

For Speed-Networking, the pupils were split into small groups and 'interviewed' 28 volunteers about their careers. They had time to ask questions about the various industries they represented and how they can go about entering those industries with the aim of giving the pupils an insight into how their work at school now prepares them for the careers they will be following in less than 10 years' time!



Year 11 were fantastic ambassadors for St Mark's on all three days and judging by their feedback, they were three days well worth experiencing!







A Book Fair came to the LRC at the beginning of November, giving students, and staff too, a great opportunity to snap up some half-price bargains in time for Christmas!




The Hounslow Teen Read 2019:





Sparrow Schools

Working for the Common Good is one the key features of any Catholic community and one of the charities supported by St Mark's is Sparrow Schools in Johannesburg, South Africa. The charity was started by Jackie Gallagher in 1990 and is an Educational Trust comprising two schools and a Further Education and Training (FET) college where over 700 children and young adults, unable to cope in mainstream education, are



given a chance to become contributing members of

society. Many of the students at Sparrow come from families devastated by HIV/AIDS. There are children who have faced abuse, exploitation, deprivation and homelessness. Some are orphans and will never have experienced parental love; many live in the townships and will have had to fend for themselves from a very young age.

Last Thursday one of the teachers from Sparrow, Lindo Hadebe was able to visit St Mark's and share her experiences with a group of our students followed by a lively Q&A session which was informative and entertaining for all concerned.

Throughout the school year there are many opportunities for fundraising and it is always good for us to see what an impact these activities, the generosity of students, parents and staff, can have on the lives and life chances of others.

As Prize Giving draws ever nearer and we have the chance to celebrate the achievements of our pupils, perhaps it is worth reflecting on the school's exam results.

The summer results were the result of the hard work of pupils, staff and parents and they are a credit to the whole community. The key Government measure of Progress 8 published the school in the top 1% of schools nationally. The School was ranked 23rd out

of over 5000 schools and in fact it ranked as the second best Catholic school in the country. This is an amazing achievement.

Progress 8 is a complicated calculation but in effect it means the pupils at St Mark's did one grade better on average than they were expected or if they were in a school which had a progress figure of zero. This result is even more startling when you realise this was achieved without recourse to a range of alternative courses. At St Mark's pupils follow a timetabled academic curriculum; in fact 91% of pupils entered the Ebacc. The average grade for pupils in their best eight subjects was a grade 6. The Sixth Form continues to grow and flourish and the school can be rightly proud of its alumni at the top universities in the UK. It is always a pleasure to welcome them back as they are an inspiration to the younger pupils. At A Level the school has an ALPS + score of 3 which means the pupils continue to make progress from GCSE.

Prizegiving will recognise pupils from Year 7 to Year 13 with prizes given to forms, application, progress, subject prizes and special awards.

FRIDAY 16TH NOVEMBER 2018

Year 9 students, Miss Mitchell, Miss Davies, Miss Brown and Mr Waters had a memorable day trip to Ypres, Belgium.

It was an early start (5.00 a.m!) on Friday morning when everybody arrived at school. Everyone waved goodbye to their parents and then we set off to the Eurotunnel terminal.

After a quiet coach journey we arrived at the terminal where we had just enough time to grab some breakfast. We jumped back on the coach and drove on to the train.

After a short crossing we arrived in France and then after an hour or so into Belgium (without stopping!) .We began our tour with some of the many cemeteries that are dotted in and around Ypres. Firstly we visited Essex Farm Cemetery, which not only contained the grave of one of the youngest soldiers of the war (aged 15) but also the grave of a soldier who was awarded the Victoria Cross. The cemetery was built on the site of an old field hospital. Mr Waters revealed that this was where Dr John McCrae wrote one of the war's most famous poems: "In Flanders Fields",

Our next historical site was called Hill 62. This is one of the two remaining places where original trenches from World War I have been preserved. Pupils climbed down into the trenches and tried to make their way through them. As they did they caught a real glimpse of how cold, wet and scared the soldiers must have felt a hundred years before. Many students bravely traveled through the underground tunnels and those in wellies went deep into the icy cold mud.








We then visited two more cemeteries, one German (Langemark) and one British (Tynecot). The two contrasting cemeteries varied hugely in their design and philosophy but were both equally moving. We all felt a desire to stop, think and question. We then proceeded to the excellent Passchendaele Museum. It was packed full of everyday items from the war. It had a huge collection of weapons, clothing and other wartime items.

Our last stop was Ypres town centre and the famous Menin gate. The Menin Gate is a huge arch containing thousands of names of soldiers who died in the war. It was one of the many sights from the day which allowed us to appreciate the sheer scale of the war. It is here at 8 o'clock every night that a solemn ceremony called the Last Post takes place. Unfortunately because ours is a day trip we could not stay to participate in this ceremony.

Being slightly ahead of schedule, we were able to quickly visit one of the town's renowned chocolate shops. Students took the time to buy presents for their loved ones. Making our way home, I think both students and teachers alike felt it had been a hugely successful day, one that provoked a great deal of thought and created a lot of new memories.

On Saturday 24th November all the Silver and Bronze participants took part on an Expedition First Aid course facilitated by paramedics from the London Ambulance Service to help them understand the risks and how to manage the situation when out on their expeditions. Oliwia Garniewska [12PMO] shares her experience of this event.

"During the First Aid course, we learnt essential skills on how to save and preserve life. Altogether we had six sessions, each focussing on different aspects of first aid. In one session we discussed what might be a good way provide First Aid as a first responder- we all got an opportunity to

give our opinion and to learn from one another as well as the instructors. During other sessions, we got to practise how to give someone a CPR and how to deal with a fractured ankle. What I found most interesting was how to put people in the recovery position. They taught us about doing things I wouldn't think were important to do like lifting someone's chin to prevent them from choking. Overall I found it very educational and the course has provided me with new life skills."

- Vertical Wall




Students rotated from one activity to another, with a lunch break in between. There was also the opportunity at lunch time to buy snacks and ice-creams – it was a really hot day!




Fernandes whose saves were crucial to keeping St Mark's in the game and allowing them to progress to the next round of the cup.
