Andrea Waugh-Lucas, Headteacher Doing an EPQ (Extended Project Qualification) was one of the most beneficial experiences that I have had in school; through supplementing my A-Level courses as well as extending and challenging me beyond them, it provided me with what I was missing in my time in the Sixth Form.

An important aspect of the EPQ is the freedom of choice that we were given in choosing our project topics, which we would research and write a 5,000 word report on. This gave me an opportunity to figure out which specific area of Biology I was most interested in and wanted to spend my time researching. The EPQ allowed me to venture beyond the borders of my A-Level course specifications. I did my project on the potential application of mycorrhizal fungi in degraded boreal and temperate forest ecosystems, something which is not covered at all in Biology A-Level but I found myself fascinated by. The EPQ is the perfect opportunity to delve deeper into a topic that interests you, regardless of its relation to your current courses.

Although starting a project to be concluded with a 5,000 word report seems intimidating, the EPQ process was manageable as the support we were given was balanced well with independent study. We were given structure, accountability and guidance from the Centre Coordinator

(Dr Chakraborty), our supervisors and the teachers that led our taught sessions. We completed an online course, as well as doing research on our topics independently whilst meeting regularly with Dr Chakraborty and our supervisors to discuss our projects and track our progress in our log books. The taught sessions by Mr Shore, Dr Callaghan, Mr Mihailovic and Mr Fanning helped us develop skills like referencing, writing for different audiences and presenting confidently. I think that the balance between being left to independently develop research and writing skills through the writing of the report and the backbone given by teachers, allows the EPQ to be a good intermediary between A-Level and university study.

Doing an EPQ requires a great amount of effort, time and motivation, which can take time to develop. I struggled the most with timing and developing the background knowledge required to write my report, but I think that it was through developing these skills that I gained the passion and therefore motivation to complete my project. I think that because of my growing interest in my topic, it became easier and more enjoyable as I progressed further. This, I think, is one of the most valuable parts of the EPQ as it taught me how much easier it is to put time and effort into something you enjoy and love. All of the lessons I have learned over the course of my EPQ journey have led me to produce a report that I am proud of and have taught me things that I will take with me well into the future.

I am extremely grateful for all the help that I have received from Dr Chakraborty, Mr Crone (my supervisor) and all of the teachers that led taught sessions. I recommend the EPQ to any Year 12 that has an interest that they want to develop and share.

QUALIFICATION

An EPQ is a perfect opportunity to gain a better understanding into a topic that you are passionate about. For me, it was centred around the role of the gut microbiota in Autism Spectrum Disorder; it allowed me to look at the current research being conducted as scientists try to determine a cause for Autism. It also provided an opportunity for me to analyse the effectiveness of treatments that have developed from their findings. Although an EPQ requires independent study, there are taught sessions offered by teachers ranging from sessions on how to reference and how to engage your audience during a presentation. Throughout the process, I have been able to develop new skills and reinforce those needed for A Levels, such as organisational skills, time management and presentation skills, all of which will be beneficial for future studies. It has been incredibly rewarding to see the project come together, all culminating in the final presentation, where I was able to share my findings with teachers and other

students. I also enjoyed watching other presentations to find out what my peers had been researching, as I gained insight into subject's areas I would not have researched otherwise. While the process can be challenging there are numerous benefits and I would highly recommend undertaking an EPQ.


CEIAG at St Mark's - (Careers Education, Information, Advice and Guidance)








Creepy crawlies because I like arthropods and I liked being able to walk around the whole exhibit finding different interactive information




The best gallery was the Mammals gallery because it was amazing to see such a variety of species in one place.

Creepy crawlies because they had many realistic sculptures






The funniest activity was the crossword as looking for the different dinosaur nicknames was difficult but it felt very satisfying when you found one

Eco Club has come around due to the request of 6th formers concerned about climate anxiety. We wanted to transform worry into action. A club was formed where we could educate each other about climate change and biodiversity loss as well as making actionable steps within our school. Although this was quite an ambitious task, the St Marks Eco club has come very far. This included promoting our simple but crucial initiatives.

In April 2022 we delivered our ideas about a more environmentally friendly school to Ms Waugh Lucas and Mrs Fear. Since the meeting the following initiatives and changes have been made in the school.

The first initiative was "recycle it": we thought it was such a waste that so much of our plastic was not being recycled, and with the hard work of the eco club, we have introduced two bins stationed all over the school and in classrooms to encourage recycling plastic card and paper.

The next initiative was to "switch it off"; this was brought about to reduce carbon footprint, a sour electricity bill was a whopping £120,000 this academic year! All staff were given a sticker to remind students to switch off electrics in the room when not in use.

Lastly, the third initiative was to "reuse it", in which we challenged students at St Mark's to use reusable water bottles instead to reduce and stop the waste and use of plastic. This saw an extremely positive response, with 1 in 5 students changing their mindsets and bringing in reusable water bottles! Reducing plastic waste is extremely important, as it's still on the rise and is expected to increase by 5 by 2050. We need to take a stance now.

Currently, microplastics (small pieces of plastic) are found in 80% of drinking water across the globe, so we need to act immediately. To ensure that this incredible project continues, we assigned two eco warriors in each form, who represent our initiatives and encourage their peers to be environmentally aware.

We have had a really POSITIVE response from staff and students. The teachers have also commented on the changing landscape of St Mark's: "Yes to reusable water bottles" and

"the eco initiatives are a great idea, the red bins (plastic) are so useful". Let's keep this up by working together to promote a cleaner environment.

"I think the Eco club has made good progress. I am feeling good seeing the changes, it makes me happy. The club brings togetherness and I am happier when I see students express their care for the environment."Yr 13 student.

On March 1st, the best young speakers of Hounslow assembled at the "Speak Out" Challenge! Regional Final 2021-2022. As you know from the last edition of



Veritas, the whole of Year 10 received public speaking training and battled through several in school stages until there was only 1 pupil left; that pupil being Joy Soriano of 10 Clitherow. Her task; to represent St Mark's against some really tough competition under the pressure of a stage, a spotlight and a fearsome looking judging panel.

The evening was hosted by our very own Thea Kurukulasuriya Fernando who did a great job introducing each speech and ad-libbing between them - all with the pressure of no script!

Joy delivered her speech entitled 'the Importance of relationships' and really did deliver on such a big occasion. If I was on the judging panel, I would have placed her in the top 3 but it wasn't to be on the night. Although Joy didn't win a prize, she was an outstanding representative for St Mark's and should be extremely proud of the journey she had and the massive improvement in confidence she had as a result of her involvement in this competition.







On Wednesday 15th June, a group from year 7 went to the Design Museum in Kensington. The visit started with a Sustainable Design workshop which introduced the group to a range of ways items have been adapted to be more sustainable. The students were most surprised by the Gumdrop

bin that not only is used to collect used chewing gum, but is also made from used chewing gum!

Towards the end of the workshop the students were challenged to think creatively about how they could design a more sustainable version of an everyday item. The students came up with some amazing ideas including a clothing kit that encouraged adaptation of the item to keep updating it rather than buying another one.

In the afternoon we had time to look at some of the different exhibitions, starting with the Designer Maker User exhibition which gave students a chance to see how a range of items they regularly use or see have changed over time. The students were fascinated by the array of items ranging from kitchen design through to how gaming controllers have changed.



Finally we went to an exhibition about football - Designing the Beautiful Game, which looked at the ways design has changed many different aspects of football. The students got to see how footballs and football boots have



changed, how stadium design has developed and how initiatives at the grassroot level are pushing back against the way football has become more commercialised. The students enjoyed seeing the range of artefacts, having a chance to design a football stadium and watching a video centred around Zinedine Zidane's movement during a match.































We have been busy in the Gardening Club since we last reported, we have been lucky enough to be joined by two Year 12s who are volunteering with us for their Silver Duke of Edinburgh award – thanks to them for their support. We are a lively/giddy group and the Year 12's bring some calm to proceedings!

We are growing some vegetables in troughs and containers to see what we can grow in small spaces. It has been fun to grow courgettes, cucumbers and tomatoes which have been successful, despite visits from foxes who seem to like digging in the containers. The sweetcorn is making progress, but is a bit slow and our spinach seems to have disappeared completely. We all enjoyed planting cucamelons. The alternate cold and hot weather is not great for gardening. We are also growing some edible flowers and wildflowers to attract more helpful wildlife to our garden.

CLASSICS TRIP

On the 1st of June, our Classics class had the amazing opportunity to visit the British Museum. Being the only state school offering Classics A Level, it was an enriching experience to explore the artefacts alongside our consortium students from Gumley and Gunnersbury. It was a fabulous way to extend our learning beyond just the setting of a

classroom, particularly through such a practical and palpable approach.

One of the key things that stood out to us was the extensive number of vases that depicted Odysseus in his nostos (homecoming journey). He is the starring protagonist in half of our course and all of us found it incredibly enlightening because we were able to fully understand how the ancient Greeks perceived one of their most complicated heroes through the red and black figure vases. It's akin to a portal in time! Seeing ancient history from our textbooks come alive in the form of statues, painting, coins and vases allowed us to view the ancient world in a new, more tangible light. The statues breathed life into



our knowledge, especially of Roman politicians, as we stared into the depths of the souls of Julius Caesar, Augustus, Pompey, and Alexander the Great. We also took the opportunity to explore different periods and spaces in time to broaden our historical and cultural horizons as we came across Egyptian mummies, Japanese honorary armour and figureheads of Socrates, Euripides, and Homer.

We also had the fantastic chance to visit some of the unique exhibitions. As a class, our favourite one was Feminine Power: the divine to the demonic. There were many paintings and statues

that displayed females in myths who have extraordinary influence even to this day. The goddesses Venus and Athena enjoyed their spotlight in the exhibition as epitomes of feminine beauty and intellect. One specific painting that stood out to our whole class was that of the sorceress Circe by Waterhouse. Her story is more than relevant to our course as her power as sorceress turned sailors into pigs leading to Odysseus staying on her island Aeaea for a year on his adventures. It was one of the most beautiful paintings in the gallery!

Overall, we found it an enriching experience as we had the opportunity to see artefacts we study and spent some fun time with each other and really enjoyed the day!



Aid to the Church in Need Prayer Initiative for Ukraine

Our school has been supporting the people of Ukraine materially and spiritually since the start of the war. We want to continue doing so by responding to Pope Francis' call to pray "intensely" for peace in Ukraine and for an end to the "diabolical senselessness of violence".

Social Outreach and Charity Work

The international charity Aid to the Church in Need (ACN) has invited us to launch a prayer initiative for secondary schools across the UK. Each year, Aid to the Church in Need funds approximately 5,000 projects in more than 140 countries around the world, helping to support the Church in its mission, and bringing hope and solidarity to millions of people.



The charity has already committed €1 million (more than £830,000) towards emergency aid to support the work of the Church in Ukraine and has an ongoing appeal to support their project partners working in Ukraine.

The prayer initiative is to encourage secondary school-aged students to pray for Ukraine. We were asked to produce a series of short videos of teenagers leading prayers; either prayers they have written or well-known/traditional prayers or a mixture of both.

We were delighted to be involved in this campaign to encourage young people to pray. Students from across all key stages were involved in this initiative and we are very proud of their dedication.


Teacher Karaoke On Tuesday 12th of July we were


